#### **Trees of Awareness**

To represent all the women served by the West Virginia Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program and to guide supporters in the community, Rose Rattay, Clinical Nurse Coordinator for the Mammography Department at Monongalia General Hospital, developed a promotional program titled, "Trees of Awareness." Artificial trees were decorated with ribbons reflecting donations made in memory of an individual lost to cancer or other chronic illness or to honor a cancer survivor. Ribbons for the trees were sold at the Monongalia General Information Desk, the Mammography Department, Wedgewood Imaging, and other participating physicians' offices in the Morgantown community. During October, the "Trees of Awareness" raised \$2,447.16 for the West Virginia Diagnostic and Treatment Fund and over 5,000 educational packets containing breast health information were distributed.





**Quilts of Hope** 

Every two years, quilters from around the state create beautiful masterpieces that serve as symbols of hope to women in their fight against breast cancer. The 2004-2006 Quilt Project raised over \$25,000 for the Diagnostic and Treatment Fund and volunteers spent over 3,975 hours designing, quilting, and selling donation tickets for the quilts. A challenge fabric for the 2006-2008 Project was chosen at this year's Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon. Each group will receive four yards of the challenge fabric and then design a quilt using other fabrics of their choosing. We look forward to seeing the finished quilts and encourage women to help support the distribution of the donation tickets.
