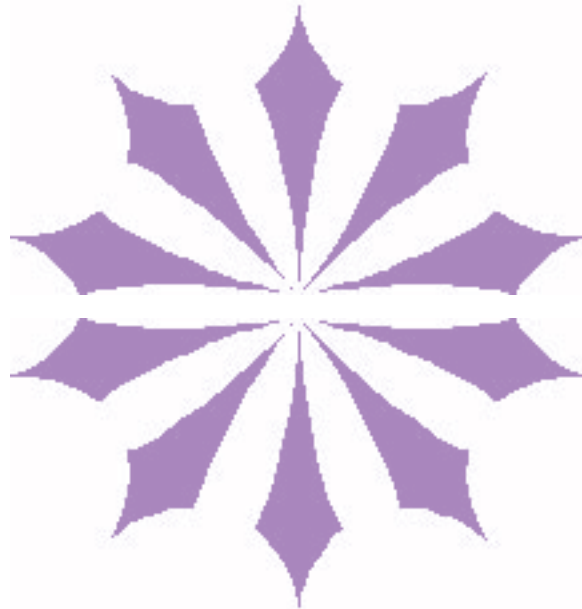

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## PURPOSE OF THE BOARD

The *Family Protection Services Board* is a group of committed citizens appointed by the Governor of the State of West Virginia. The mission of the *Family Protection Services Board* is to assure that programs working toward the elimination of domestic violence are adequately funded and provide quality services to victims.

The purposes of the Board are to provide ongoing administration and allocation of the *West Virginia Family Protection Funds*; to establish and enforce a system of standards for the annual licensure of domestic violence programs and batterer intervention programs; to research and study issues pertinent to programs for victims of domestic violence and report the results to the Governor and the Legislature.

## BACKGROUND

The *Family Protection Services Board* was established by the passage of the Domestic Violence Act of 1989. This Act institutes the licensure of all domestic violence programs in the state, establishes the membership and duties of the Board, and provides directives for the allocation of funds collected through fees on marriages and divorces in West Virginia.

Funds collected through the marriage/divorce fees are placed in a Special Revenue Account which is administered through the Department of Health and Human Resources.



## DUTIES OF THE BOARD

As described in §48-2C-4 and §48-2C-13 of the West Virginia Code, also known as the Domestic Violence Act, it is the duty of the *Family Protection Services Board* to:

- Regulate its procedural practice.
- Facilitate the formation and operation of shelters.
- Receive and consider applications for the development of domestic violence shelters and perpetrator intervention programs.
- Promulgate rules and regulations to implement provisions of §48-2C-1 through §48-2C-15 and any applicable federal guidelines.
- Advise the Commissioner of the Department of Health and Human Resources on matters of concern relative to his or her responsibilities under §48-2C-1 through §48-2C-15.
- Study issues pertinent to family protection shelters, programs for domestic violence victims, and report the results to the governor and the Legislature.
- Conduct hearings as necessary under §48-2C-1 through §48-2C-15.
- Delegate to the Commissioner of DHHR the powers and duties of the board, including, but not limited to, the authority to approve, disapprove, revoke or suspend licenses.
- Deliver funds to shelters.
- Establish a system of peer review for domestic violence shelters and perpetrator intervention programs which will ensure the safety, well being and health of the clients of all shelters operating in the state.
- Evaluate annually each funded shelter to determine its compliance with the goals and objectives set out in its original application for funding or subsequent revisions.
- To award shelters, for each fiscal year, ninety-five percent of the total funds collected and paid during the fiscal year to a special revenue account and to expend a sum not in excess of five percent of funds for administration costs.
- Establish and enforce a system of standards for annual licensure for all shelters and perpetrator intervention programs in the state.
- Enforce standards.
- Review rules and regulations biannually.



## BOARD MEMBERSHIP *FY 2001*

The *Family Protection Services Board* consists of five members. The Governor, with the advice of and consent of the Senate, appoints three members of the Board. One member is a director of a domestic violence shelter. One member is a member of a major trade association which represents shelters across the state. The final gubernatorial appointee is a member of the public.

Appointed members serve three year terms. The other two members are the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Resources, or his or her designee and Chair of the Governor's Committee on Crime, Delinquency, and Correction, or his or her designee.

## ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

In order to qualify for grant funds, each family protection shelter or program must meet the following requirements:

- Provide or propose to provide a facility which will serve as a temporary shelter to receive, care and provide services for persons who are victims of domestic violence or abuse and their children;
- Be incorporated in the State of West Virginia as a nonprofit corporation;
- Have a board of directors which represents a broad spectrum of the community to be served, including at least one person who is or has been a victim of domestic violence or abuse;
- Receive at least 55% of its funds from sources other than funds distributed through the Domestic Violence Act . These sources may be public or private and may include contributions of goods or services and;
- Require persons employed by or volunteering services to the shelter or program to maintain the confidentiality of any information which may identify individuals served.

## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

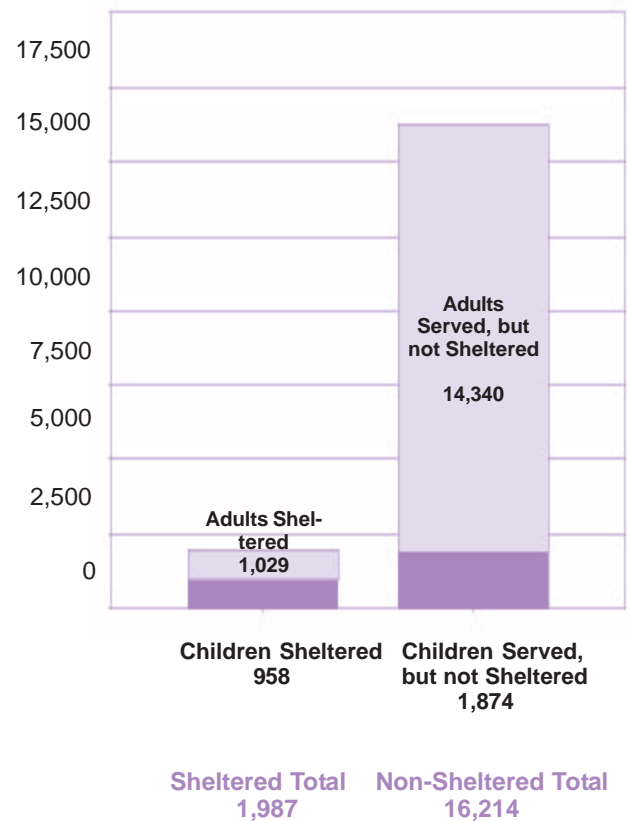


- A total of **18,201** initial contacts were made by domestic violence program staff.

- Volunteers contributed **35,018** hours of service.
- A total of **1,536** community programs were conducted throughout the state with an attendance total **52,524** participants.

These numbers represent an unplicated count of adults and children served by the licensed programs.

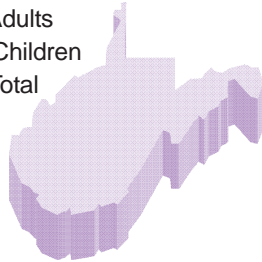

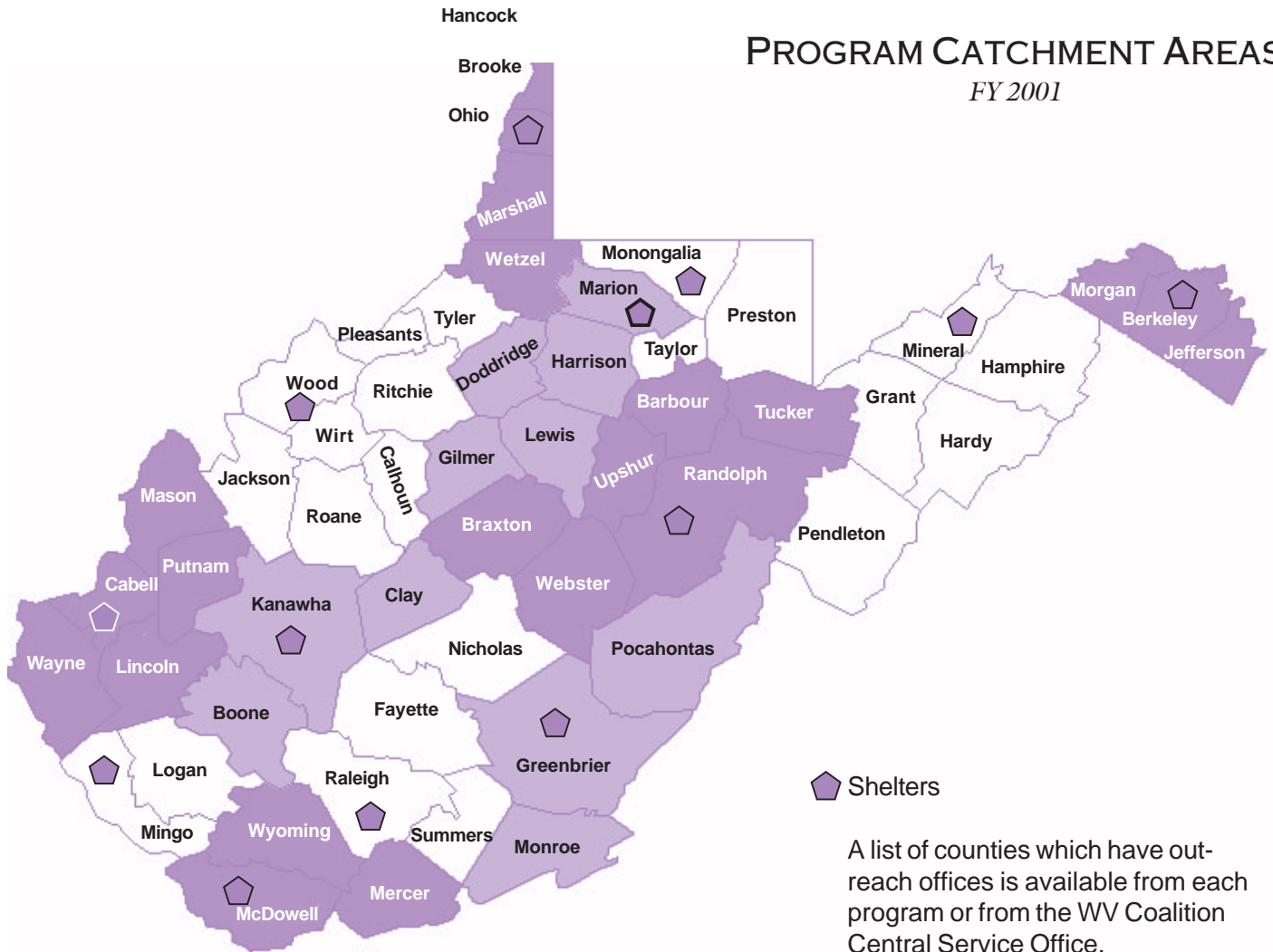

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## CIVIL LEGAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

The need for legal assistance to victims of domestic violence has been well documented in West Virginia and across the country. The 1999 Legislature allocated \$150,000 to the Domestic Violence Legal Services Fund, to be distributed by the Family Protection Services Board to licensed domestic violence programs. Due to various delays, the funds were not disbursed to the domestic violence programs until June 2000. At that time, agreements were developed between the domestic violence programs and the West Virginia Legal Services Plan to hire attorneys as needed to assist domestic violence victims with protective order hearings, divorce and child custody hearings, and other civil procedures for which victims can usually not afford legal counsel.

The following pages reflect the services provided to victims of domestic violence from July 2000 through June 2001 through five of the six funded programs. Due to a data collection error, data are not available from the program in Huntington.

Of those programs reporting, 285 domestic violence victims received the services of an attorney at an average cost per case of less than \$500.00. The majority of victims received assistance with divorce proceedings and child support, which enabled them to take critical steps toward independence and self-sufficiency for themselves and their children.

### *Family Crisis Center*

- ◆ Twenty four of twenty referrals were seen by attorneys recruited through the West Virginia Legal Services Plan Judicare Program.
- ◆ Nine cases involved divorce, six cases involved custody, two involved emergency child custody, and two cases were domestic violence petitions.

### *Family Crisis Intervention Center, Inc.*

- ◆ Forty-four out of forty-six referrals have been seen by attorneys recruited through the Judicare Program, which is operated directly by the Family Crisis Intervention Center.
- ◆ Forty-nine cases were divorce actions, four cases i involved child custody, and one case was a domestic violence petition.



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## *Rape & Domestic Violence Information Center*

- ◆ One-hundred ten out of one-hundred thirty-three cases referred were accepted for legal services by an attorney hired by the West Virginia Legal Services Plan.
- ◆ One-hundred eight cases involved divorce, ninety-four involved child custody, and forty-two cases involved child support.

### *Task Force on Domestic Violence HOPE, Inc.*

- ◆ Seventy-four out of ninety cases referred were accepted for legal services by an attorney hired by the West Virginia Legal Services Plan.
- ◆ Sixty-three cases involved divorce, thirteen cases in volved child custody, and fourteen were for miscella- neous issues such as housing and family issues.

### *Womens' Aid in Crisis*

- ◆ Thirty-five out of thirty-five clients referred for legal services were accepted for legal services by attorneys recruited through the West Virginia Legal Services Plan Judicare Program.
- ◆ Twenty-eight cases involved divorce, six cases in volved childcusotdy, and one case involved child support .



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## PERPETRATOR INTERVENTION PROGRAMS

In West Virginia and across the nation, perpetrator intervention and prevention programs have been established as a step toward changing offenders' behavior and increasing awareness of the problem of family and domestic violence. The programs are designed to hold offenders responsible for their behavior by maintaining that battering is a crime that is not justifiable and teaching alternatives to abusive behavior. They are most effective as part of a coordinated strategy in partnership with the justice system (which refers perpetrators to the program, ideally as a sentencing alternative with the understanding that re-offense will result in jail time) and licensed family protection programs (which help monitor the programs for integrity and provide safety and support services to victims).

The 1998 Legislature mandated that perpetrator intervention and prevention programs be licensed by the Family Protection Services Board [§48-2C-4 and §48-2C-13(b)]. Subsequently, rules were developed and approved, and were implemented in May 2000 when the Board conducted the first licensing review. Eight programs were reviewed and approved for licensure from July 2001 - June 2002. It is anticipated that at least two additional programs will be reviewed in the upcoming year.
