About this Webinar

Across the United States, family members are providing homes and care for children whose parents cannot care for them. These kinship care arrangements include all children who receive care from grandparents, siblings, aunts and uncles, cousins and close family members (sometimes not family at all) for a period of time. Informal kinship caregivers offer love and stability to these children through their role but many have limited resources and struggle to assume the “burden” of playing a primary parenting role. This session will explore the issue of kinship care as well as identify risk and protective factors for both the caregivers and the children. It will also examine resources to support kinship care families.
