TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (TA) NOW AVAILABLE

Would you like on-site technical assistance to help improve the quality of your program? The goal of Technical Assistance (TA) is for the Early Childhood Professional Development Team at Link, in collaboration with the caregiver and administrator, to develop an individual plan of action for quality improvements. These improvements are based on the Environmental Rating Scales (ITERS-R, ECERS-R, FCCERS-R or SACCERS) results and/or observations made by the Early Childhood Team. Short term and/or long term goals will be developed and the Professional Development Team at Link will work with individuals to meet the identified goals. Technical Assistance can be registered as a WV STARS training, if it meets the criteria.

Technical Assistance is available to Child Care Centers, Facilities and Family Child Care Providers. TA could be an especially beneficial tool for those working toward Tier II Status.

RECENT CHANGES TO THE CHILDCARE SUBSIDY PROGRAM MAY AFFECT PROVIDERS

- *The Bureau within the West Virginia DHHR that administers Services for children and families say eligibility for child care Services will change beginning August 1, 2012.
- *There will be no reduction in provider rates and no changes in the payment to providers for days of care.
- *Effective Aug. 1, 2012, copayments for eligible families will increase from the current rate of 5% to 12%. After Jan. 1, 2013 families with an income above 150% of the poverty level will no longer be eligible for child care subsidy at the time of their six month redetermination.
- *Providers will have to collect larger fees from the majority of families that are receiving child care subsidy. This in turn, will decrease the pay each month that the providers will receive from the State of West Virginia.

Ten Caregiving Gifts: Supporting Social - Emotional Development

With the holidays quickly approaching, our thoughts begin whirl around holiday celebrations and gift giving. Before the holiday rush consumes our thoughts and schedules let's take a look at **Ten Caregiving Gifts** developed by Jerree Pawl from © WestEd PITC that will help support the social-emotional development of the infants and toddlers in our care. She states:"I call these *'caregiving gifts'* because of the great benefits infants and toddlers gain in self-esteem, security and social competence." What is social-emotional development? This definition from Kadija Johnston, © WestEd PITC fits nicely with the work we do with infants and toddlers. She defines social-emotional development as "the thoughts/feelings/expectations one develops about **self**." As well as "the thoughts/feelings/expectations one develops toward **others** and the world."

Ten Caregiving Gifts

Gift One: Respond to very young infants in ways that encourage them to feel they can make things happen.

Gift Two: Help young infants learn they have ways to take care of their own needs. **Gift Three:** Help infants and toddlers develop confidence and trust in others.

Gift Four: Help babies learn about intimacy.

Gift Five: Help toddlers learn that adults cannot solve every problem.

Gift Six: Be tolerant of toddlers' internal conflicts and desires.Gift Seven: Help toddlers sort out the evaluations of adults.Gift Eight: Match your reaction to the temperament of the baby.

Gift Nine: Exchange information with families about their children.

Gift Ten: Remind children in child care of the absent family member's continued existence. BEHAVIOR CONSULTANT CORNER

This quarter, Link Child Care Resource & Referral will begin offering a new training that will assist child care providers in offering support to families who have experienced the loss of a loved one. When Families Grieve is a creation of Sesame Workshop, the non-profit education organization behind Sesame Street. This workshop is designed to give strategies to help families sort through complex emotions, remember the life of a loved one, and find strength in one another. The four primary topics within this training are:

Sharing and Talking – In this part of the session, we will explore children's understanding of death and strategies you can use for communicating with them during this difficult time.

Finding Comfort Together – This section presents ideas for you to share with families and children.

Finding Comfort Together – This section presents ideas for you to share with families and children to help them cope with emotions and changes.

Moving Forward – This critical part of the training assists child care providers in offering ways to help families use memories of their loved one to help create new family memories.

Caring Cards – These little cards can be used by child care providers and families to provide inspiration and reassurance to children throughout the day. An example of one of these cards is below:





Have children trace around one hand. Within the outline of each finger, they can write about or draw something they are looking forward to. Start small: the first butterfly of spring, learning to ride a bike.

"You're too young to be stressed!" I remember hearing this as a child. This could not be farther from the truth! Children's problems may seem miniscule to adults, but these same problems are very significant to them. It has been said, "Children share the same problems as adults. There are no small problems—only small people trying to solve the big things they can't understand. And problems produce stress." Everyone experiences stress during certain times in their lives—some more than others. Childhood stress affects children from all cultural, ethnic, and socioeconomic backgrounds. One thing is for sure, stress is practically inevitable.

What causes stress in children? The sources can run the gamut. Some possible factors are lack of expressive communication, fears and phobias, separation anxiety, divorce in a family, illness or death of a family member or friend, or enduring bullying or abuse. A young toddler who cannot express that she wants to go outside may experience the same level of stress as the young school age child who is afraid of the dark. More serious stressors, such as abuse and neglect, can negatively impact children for a longer period of time. In fact, prolonged and serious types of stressors can result in poor emotional and self control, impair cognitive development, and raise the risk of heart, metabolic and immune system diseases. Symptoms of stress can include bedwetting, nightmares, headaches, poor concentration or the desire to be alone.

There is good news! Some manageable stress is important for healthy development. Children can learn how to effectively handle their issues, and display self control. We can also help children manage stress by listening attentively to them, respecting their concerns and providing open and honest answers to questions. We can provide and model effective coping strategies early in life. As a result, these children can grow to become healthy, functioning adults. TRAILS CORNER

Hello all! I hope everyone had a wonderful summer and was able to get the school year off to a terrific start. Fall is almost upon us and the weather will soon be changing. With the cooler temperatures and changing winds, it will be much more bearable to take your children outside for exercise and activities. With fall comes the colors changing, which can foster the imagination and create some beautiful artwork. I advise that you take advantage of all these perks that come along with fall and enjoy the outdoors before the winter and the cold set in.

I would like to take a minute to inform you or remind you of some opportunities available to you through the T.R.A.I.L.S. van and our team. First, as most of you already know, we have an enormous supply of games, activities, resources, books, toys, etc. available for you to check out from us and use in your classrooms or homes with the children in your care. Our inventory covers almost any topic, theme, genre, or issue you may want to discuss or teach. We also have items for every age group. We recently have been able to purchase many new items and equipment available now for checkout. Our inventory has grown and many of these items are new to the manufacturer also. This means even if you have not been utilizing the van in the past, you may now be interested. Many times I hear providers tell me they have most of the items we carry on the van. With these newly purchased items it is very likely we now have resources you may have never even heard of or seen before. Please take advantage of these opportunities to introduce new and exciting resources and ideas to the children in your care. These items may be borrowed from the T.R.A.I.L.S. van and returned on the following visit from the van. Visits are usually about a month apart, so you have plenty of time to enjoy the borrowed items with your children.

I also would like to remind all of the FCC providers of the training opportunities that the T.R.A.I.L.S. Specialist can provide. An FCC provider may obtain four of their needed training hours per year from these training sessions. The sessions are conducted by the T.R.A.I.L.S. Specialist who will come to your home for a one-on-one or small cluster training. The sessions are WV STARS registered and you will receive two hours of training per session. For those of you who may have difficulties getting out and attending the regular training sessions offered, these may be very helpful in obtaining your required number of training hours per year. IMPORTANT TRAINING INFORMATION

- 1. All trainings begin promptly at the scheduled time. Please arrive before the session begins. If you miss 15 or more minutes during the course of any training session, you will not receive credit for that training.
- 2. If you are disruptive or prevent the Trainer from staying on task, you will be asked to leave and your Regulatory Specialist will be notified.
- 3. If you sign up for a training and do not call to cancel at least 24 hours in advance, your Regulatory Specialist will be notified.
- 4. No cell phones or electronic devices may be used during the training sessions.
- 5. You may not bring children to any Link training session.
- 6. You must bring a picture ID to all trainings.
- 7. You are responsible for keeping your training certificates on file. All trainings we offer are registered with WV STARS.
- 8. You must register for training sessions at least 24 hours in advance.

Descriptions of Training Sessions:

Business of Family Child Care, The	This workshop will help Family Child Care Providers keep good financial records and understand record keeping, deductions and ways to reduce the risks of running a business in their home.
Challenging Behaviors: Where do We Begin?	This workshop provides insight into challenging behavior and self-regulation in children and gives teachers ideas and strategies to help children learn new ways to behave.
Environments That Educate	This training will focus on why the environment is important and how to develop a curriculum that can best meet the needs of all children in child care.
Food For Thought: Eating Well on a Budget	This training uses PBS materials focusing on healthy food choices, budgeting and activities to use with children to promote healthy choices.
Helping Children Cope with Stress	PBS workshop concentrating on ways to help children manage stressful situations such as fear, loss and bullying.
If You Could See Me Now!	Caregivers will review and learn the benefits of observation. They will practice and define several observation techniques. Providers will then discuss the importance of confidentiality. They will wrap with learning about reporting methods and sharing results with parents.
It's All in the Process: Open Ended Art	This training session will explain the meaning of open-ended art, why it is important, and give art ideas to use with children .
Knock Out Bullying	This training helps providers learn about the different types of bullying, how to identify a bully, and strategies and techniques to prevent bullying and resolve conflicts.
Making a Difference: Mandate to Report, Responsibility to Prevent Child Abuse and Neglect	Training focusing on recognizing the signs of various types of abuse and neglect, reporting and preventing child abuse and neglect, and the reporting process.
What's Temperament Got To Do With It?	Caregivers will explore the nine temperament traits. They will look at how their own temperament influences their caregiving. Caregivers will glean information on how to use the information from temperament assessment to individualize care for the infants and toddlers in their classrooms or family childcare homes.
When Families Grieve	This workshop focuses on ways to support families and children during the difficult time surrounding the death of a loved one.
Young at Art	Participants will learn how opened ended art supports several developmental domains. They will spend time experiencing open ended art activities appropriate for toddlers. Their handouts will include ideas and recipes for toddler art experiences.

ACDS Receives National Interest and Recognition

In June, the Coordinators of West Virginia's Apprenticeship for Child Development Specialist (ACDS) program presented at the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Institute for Early Childhood Professional Development in Indianapolis, Indiana. Sherrie Barrett and Jennifer Conkle presented a session highlighting the history, funding, and structure of the apprenticeship program in WV. Participation during the session was positive and engaging and several states showed a strong interest in learning more about how the apprenticeship program works successfully in West Virginia.

On August 1, the ACDS program was recognized by the United States Department of Labor as an "Innovative and Trailblazing" apprenticeship program. FAMILY CHILD CARE GRANTS ARE AVAILABLE

Family Child Care Providers are eligible to apply for grants of up to **\$250**. These grants can be used to purchase resources required in regulations, curriculum materials, and/or to pay for **WV STARS application fees**. You must turn in receipts for the money you spend. Failure to do so will make you ineligible for future Family Child Care Grants and other grants that may become available through Link.
