	DECISION OF STATE HEARING OFFICER
I.	INTRODUCTION:
	This is a report of the State Hearing Officer resulting from a fair hearing concluded on May 31, 2006 for This hearing was held in accordance with the provisions found in the Common Chapters Manual, Chapter 700 of the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources. This fair hearing was convened on April 20, 2006 on a timely appeal filed January 18, 2006.
II.	PROGRAM PURPOSE:

The program entitled Aged/Disabled Waiver is set up cooperatively between the Federal and State governments and administered by the West Virginia Department of Health & Human Resources.

Under Section 2176 of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, states were allowed to request a waiver from the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) so that they could use Medicaid (Title XIX) funds for home and community-based services. The program's target population is individuals who would otherwise be placed in an intermediate or skilled nursing facility (if not for the waiver services). Services offered under the Waiver Program will include: (1) chore, (2) homemaker and (3) case management services. West Virginia has been offering the Waiver Services Program since July, 1982 to those financially eligible individuals who have been determined to need ICF level care but who have chosen the Waiver Program services as opposed to being institutionalized.

	The question(s) to be decided is whether the Agency is correct in its proposal to terminate services under the Aged/Disabled Waiver (HCB) Program.

VII.	FINDINGS OF FACT:

- 1) On November 21, 2005, the Claimant was reevaluated (medically assessed) to verify continued medical eligibility for participation in the Aged & Disabled Waiver Services Program, hereinafter ADW, and to confirm the appropriate Level of Care.
- 2) The medical assessment (exhibit D-2) completed by WVMI determined that the Claimant is no longer medically eligible to participate in the ADW Program.

3) On December 8, 2005, a notice of Potential Denial (exhibit D-3), was sent to the Claimant. This notice states, in pertinent part:

To be eligible for benefits you must be deficient in at least 5 of 13 critical areas as mandated in the Medicaid Program Regulations. Based on your PAS you have deficiencies in only 3 areas – Bathing, Grooming and Dressing.

Since your PAS did not indicate the required deficits, your request for benefits cannot be approved.

The Claimant was notified that she could provide additional information regarding her medical condition within the next 2-weeks for consideration before a final decision was made.

- Additional medical information was received and has been identified as exhibit D-3a. Included in this exhibit is correspondence from MD and _______, the Claimant's niece. WVMI reviewed the additional information and was able to award the Claimant an additional deficit in bladder incontinence.
- 5) A termination notice (exhibit D-4) was sent to the Claimant on January 9, 2006. This notice includes some of the following pertinent information:

Your request for benefits under the Home and Community Based Aged/Disabled Waiver Program has been terminated/denied.

An evaluation of your current medical condition indicates that you are not entitled to services under the AD Waiver Program. A decision has been made to terminate / deny your homemaker and case management services.

Eligibility for the Aged/Disabled Waiver program requires deficits in at least 5 of the health areas below. Your PAS (Pre-Admission Screening Form) indicated deficiencies in 4 areas – Bathing, Grooming, Dressing and Continence.

6) The Claimant's representatives contend that the Claimant should have been awarded deficits eating, medication administration and vacating a building in the event of an emergency.

Testimony received in support of a deficit in eating reveals that the Claimant had difficulty manipulating eating utensils. The Claimant's arms and hands frequently shake (observed during the hearing) causing spillage and making her unable to cut her own food. All of the Claimant's food must be soft or cut due to episodes of choking. Based on this evidence, a deficit is awarded in eating (+1).

- 7) Evidence reveals that the Claimant's medications are set up in baggies by family members for organization purposes and easier access. While there have been episodes when the Claimant has taken incorrect dosages (took both baggies), in order for an individual to qualify for a deficit in medication administration, the Claimant must require the prescription medication be placed in her hand, mouth, tube, or eye by someone other than herself at all times. A deficit in medication administration cannot be awarded.
- Representatives testifying on behalf of the Claimant indicated that the Claimant suffers from shortness of breath when she tries to hurry and she is disoriented when she wakes-up. It was also noted that the Claimant ambulates slowly and that her name appears on a list at her apartment complex as an individual who would require assistance with vacating in an emergency. However, in order for an individual to qualify for a deficit vacating the building, the individual must at a Level 3 or higher in walking or mentally incapable of leaving the building at Level 3 or higher in orientation with a diagnosis of dementia, Alzheimers, or related condition. Based on this evidence, the Claimant does not qualify for a deficit in vacating the building in the event of an emergency.
- 9) Aged/Disabled Home and Community-Based Services Manual Section 570 Program Eligibility for client:

Applicants for the ADW Program must meet the following criteria to be eligible for the Program:

- C. Be approved as medically eligible for NF Level of Care.
- 10) Aged/Disabled Home and Community-Based Services Manual Section 570.1.a Purpose: The purpose of the medical eligibility review is to ensure the following:
 - A. New applicants and existing clients are medically eligible based on current and accurate evaluations.
 - B. Each applicant/client determined to be medically eligible for A/DW services receives an appropriate LOC that reflects current/actual medical condition and short and long-term services needs.
 - C. The medical eligibility determination process is fair, equitable and consistently applied throughout the state.
- 11) Aged/Disabled Home and Community-Based Services Manual Section 570.1.b Medical Criteria:

An individual must have five deficits on the PAS to qualify medically for the A/DW Program. These deficits are derived from a combination of the following assessment elements on the PAS:

A. Decubitus - Stage 3 or 4 (Item 24 on PAS 2005)

- B. Unable to vacate a building- a person is physically unable at all times at Level 3 or higher in walking or mentally incapable of leaving the building at Level 3 or higher in orientation with a diagnosis of dementia, Alzheimers, or related condition. (Item 25, I and 33, on the PAS 2005).
- C. Functional abilities of individual in the home. (Item 25 on the PAS 2005).

Eating----- Level 2 or higher (physical assistance to get nourishment, not preparation)

Bathing ---- Level 2 or higher (physical assistance or more)
Grooming--- Level 2 or higher (physical assistance or more)
Dressing ---- Level 2 or higher (physical assistance or more)

Continence-- Level 3 or higher (must be total incontinent- defined as when the recipient has no control of bowel or bladder functions at any time)

Orientation-- Level 3 or higher (totally disoriented, comatose)

Transfer---- Level 3 or higher (one person or two person assist in the

home)

Walking----- Level 3 or higher (one person assist in the home)

Wheeling---- Level 3 or higher (must be Level 3 or 4 on walking in the home to use Level 3 or 4 for wheeling in the home. Do not count outside the home)

- D. Individual has skilled needs in one or more of these areas B (g)suctioning, (h)tracheostomy, (i)ventilator, (k)parenteral fluids, (l)sterile dressings, or (m) irrigations. (Item 26 on the PAS 2005)
- E. The individual is not capable of administering his/her own medications is defined as an individual not capable of administering his/her own medications if the prescription medication must be placed in the recipient's hand, mouth, tube or eye by someone other than the recipient at all times.

VIII. CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

- 1) A medical assessment was completed on the Claimant to determine continued medical eligibility for participation in the Aged/Disabled Waiver Program on November 21, 2005.
- 2) Medical eligibility for the Aged/Disabled Waiver program requires deficits in at least five (5) specific categories of nursing services.
- 3) The medical assessment completed by WVMI after considering additional medical documentation reveals that the Claimant demonstrates four (4) program qualifying deficits Bathing, Grooming, Dressing and Continence.
- 4) Evidence submitted at the hearing identifies one (1) additional deficit Incontinence of bladder.

5) Whereas the Claimant exhibits deficits in five (5) of the specific categories of nursing services, the Claimant's continued medical eligibility for participation in the Aged &
Disabled Waiver Services Program is therefore established.
DECISION:
It is the decision of the State Hearing Officer to reverse the Agency's proposal to terminate the Claimant's benefits and services under the Aged/Disabled Title XIX (HCB) Waiver Program.
