Attached is a copy of the findings of fact and conclusions of law on your hearing held November 7, 2007. Your hearing request was based on the Department of Health and Human Resources' proposal to reduce your homemaker service hours under the Aged/Disabled (HCB) Title XIX Waiver Services Program.

In arriving at a decision, the State Hearing Officer is governed by the Public Welfare Laws of West Virginia and the rules and regulations established by the Department of Health and Human Resources. These same laws and regulations are used in all cases to assure that all persons are treated alike.

Eligibility for the Aged/Disabled Waiver Program is based on current policy and regulations. One of these regulations specifies that for the Aged/Disabled Waiver (ADW) Program, the number of homemaker service hours is determined based on the Level of Care (LOC). The Level of Care is determined by evaluating the Pre-Admission Screening Form (PAS) and assigning points to documented medical conditions that require nursing services. Program services are limited to a maximum number of units/hours, which is reviewed and approved by WVMI. (Aged/Disabled Home and Community-Based Services Waiver Policy and Procedures Manual 503.2)

Information submitted at your hearing reveals that your condition at the time of your Pre Admission Screening qualifies for the degree of care and services offered under the Level B of Care under the ADW program.

It is the decision of the State Hearing Officer to **uphold** the proposal of the Department to decrease your Level of Care under the Aged/Disabled Waiver Program from Level C to Level B.

DECISION OF STATE HEARING OFFICER

I. INTRODUCTION:

This is a report of the State Hearing Officer resulting from a fair hearing concluded on November 7, 2007 for █. This hearing was held in accordance with the provisions found in the Common Chapters Manual, Chapter 700 of the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources. This fair hearing was convened on November 7, 2007 on a timely appeal filed June 11, 2007.

It should be noted that the Claimant's benefits have continued pending a hearing decision.

II. PROGRAM PURPOSE:

The program entitled Aged/Disabled Waiver is set up cooperatively between the Federal and State governments and administered by the West Virginia Department of Health & Human Resources.

Under Section 2176 of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, states were allowed to request a waiver from the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) so that they could use Medicaid (Title XIX) funds for home and community-based services. The program's target population is individuals who would otherwise be placed in an intermediate or skilled nursing facility (if not for the waiver services). Services offered under the Waiver Program will include: (1) chore, (2) homemaker and (3) case management services. West Virginia has been offering the Waiver Services Program since July, 1982 to those financially eligible individuals who have been determined to need ICF level care but who have chosen the Waiver Program services as opposed to being institutionalized.

IV. QUESTIONS TO BE DECIDED:

The question(s) to be decided is whether the Agency was correct in its proposal to reduce the Claimant's homemaker service hours under the Aged/Disabled Waiver (HCB) Program.

VII. FINDINGS OF FACT:

- 1) The Claimant's Aged/Disabled Waiver case, hereinafter ADW, was undergoing an annual reevaluation to verify continued medical eligibility in May 2007.
- 2) The West Virginia Medical Institute (WVMI) nurse completed a Pre-Admission Screening (PAS) assessment (D-2) on May 15, 2007 and determined that the Claimant continues to meet the medical eligibility criteria. The WVMI nurse assigned 17 points in her evaluation of the level of care the claimant requires. Present during the evaluation was the claimant, her homemaker, the director of the Senior Center and an RN from [REDACTED].

- 3) The nurse assigned Five points for Medical Conditions and Symptoms. One point was assessed for vacating in the event of an emergency. Ten points were assessed in the area of functional abilities in the home, and one point for medication administration.
- 4) Witnesses for the Claimant raised issues in the areas of grooming and aphasia.
- 5) During the assessment, the nurse was advised that the homemaker lets the claimant go over his hair with the shampoo while she is washing his hair. The homemaker reported to the nurse that the claimant would comb his own hair if prompted to do so but that he would need supervision to make sure he did do it. The evaluating nurse assessed the claimant at a level 2 for needing physical assistance in grooming and assigned one point.
- 6) The claimant's witnesses had a letter from a physician addressing aphasia that the Hearing Officer did not admit into evidence due its late submission and the Department's objection. The nurse noted in her assessment that the claimant communicated without difficulty.
- 7) Aged/Disabled Home and Community-Based Services Waiver Policy Manual 503.2.1 and 503.2.2 (D-1): There will be four levels of care for clients of ADW homemaker services. Points will be determined based on the following sections of the PAS:

#23- Medical Conditions/Symptoms- 1 point for each (can have total of 12 points) (must be based on medical evidence presented by appropriate medical professionals)

#24- Decubitis- 1 point

#25- 1 point for b., c., or d.

#26 Functional abilities

Level 1- 0 points

Level 2- 1 point for each item a. through i.

Level 3- 2 points for each item a. through m.; i. (walking) must be equal to or greater than Level 3 before points are given for j. (wheeling)

Level 4 - 1 point for a., 1 point for e., 1 point for f., 2 points for g. through m.

#27 Professional and Technical Care Needs- 1 point for continuous oxygen

#28 Medication Administration- 1 point for b. or c.

#34- Dementia- 1 point if Alzheimer's or other dementia

#34- Prognosis- 1 point if terminal

The total number of points allowable is 44.

LEVELS OF CARE SERVICE LIMITS

Level A- 5 points to 9 points- 2 hours per day or 62 hours per month

Level B- 10 points to 17 points- 3 hours per day or 93 hours per month

Level C- 18 points to 25 points- 4 hours per day or 124 hours per month

Level D- 26 points to 44 points- 5 hours per day or 155 hours per month

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VIII. CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

- 1) Policy dictates that an individual's Level of Care for the Aged/Disabled Waiver Program is determined by the number of points the individual obtains on the PAS assessment tool.
- 2) The Claimant received 17 points on a PAS completed by WVMI in May 2007 in conjunction with an annual reevaluation. For the previous level of care, "C" the claimant would require at least 18 points.
- 3) Evidence and testimony presented during the hearing, did not support that additional points should have been awarded in the areas of grooming or aphasia. The claimant is able to participate in parts of his grooming. Policy in Attachment 14 supports the Level 2 assessment for needing Physical Assistance in grooming. Level 3 would indicate that the claimant was total care. This claimant is able to make understandable speech and therefore Aphasia was not an issue at the assessment and testimony did not support that this claimant is not able to speak.
- 4) The Department was correct in their determination to reduce the claimant's Level of Care from "C" to "B" which reduces the homemaker hours to (93) hours per month.

IX. DECISION:

It is the decision of the State Hearing Officer to **uphold** the Department's proposal to reduce the Claimant's homemaker service hours under the Aged/Disabled, Title XIX (HCB) Waiver Program.
