The WVBCCSP would like to recognize Pristine Warren, a long time volunteer in Williamson, WV. She attends the Walk for Women and Breast Cancer Awareness Day wreath-hanging in Williamson. Her aunt died of breast cancer and her sister is a breast cancer survivor. Knowing that breast cancer is one of the leading causes of death in women, Pristine strongly believes that women should get their mammograms once a year. She says that women may have a chance to live longer if they would get regular mammograms and clinical breast exams. She knows there is hope in early detection.

Pristine also volunteers for Relay for Life. She buys breast cancer items as door prizes to donate to both of the Walks. She often has afghans made to give to cancer survivors at Relay for Life.

Pristine feels that it's important to keep on working. She describes herself as a person who likes to do whatever she can to help others. She feels our work is not in vain because there is always someone that needs our help. She reminds others that we are all family, here to help others whenever we can. If you see a need, you need to help. She believes she sacrifices because God sacrificed a lot and He takes care of her. She feels strongly that we all must work together as a team. There is just too much for one person to do. Giving and sharing is simply how Pristine defines herself.

She likes to be involved in activities where she can make a difference. She is a member of Logan Street First Baptist Church, serving as secretary for the Senior choir and Senior Mission. She is a member of Sunday school, a youth counselor and during the holidays season joins other members of the church, singing Christmas carols at local hospitals and nursing homes.

Pristine feels blessed to have recovered from a stroke last May. She still tires easily and feels like she can't do as much as she used to. We expect Pristine will keep on working as long as she is able.
