Santa's Silent Night

On a bright and chilly Saturday in December, sixty-one families who receive services through Birth to Three and Easter Seals participated in our second annual Santa's Silent Night. Santa's Silent Night is a Sensitive Santa event that is tailored to meet the needs of children who have special needs and developmental delays. Our team of elves worked hard throughout the year to find ways to limit or eliminate many of the factors that make visiting a traditional Santa Claus impossible – large crowds, long wait times, bright lights, loud music, overwhelming decorations, and accessibility issues. In the week before Santa's arrival, the ballroom at our Regional Administrative Unit in Wheeling was transformed into a winter forest, full of friendly (stuffed) animals, beautiful (fake) snow, and tall (artificial) trees.

When a family arrived, they were greeted in our registration area and then escorted upstairs by an elf to meet Santa – no waiting in line! After having their picture taken, every child received a hand-picked, sensory friendly toy.







After meeting Santa, families had the opportunity to enjoy our gross motor play area, a new addition that many families who attended last year requested. Our play area had several fun activities for children to participate in, including many stuffed animals to pet, felt Christmas trees to decorate, water tiles, reindeer to feed, playhouses, blocks to stack, and obstacles to enjoy. Mrs. Claus was on hand to read Christmas stories to the children when they were done playing. After story time with Mrs. Claus, families enjoyed pizza, cookies, and drinks in our refreshment room.

All of the volunteers at our event – including all of Santa's elves and Santa himself – were trained by Birth to Three staff on the best way to work with each individual child so that the visit was enjoyable as possible. Two members of our Birth to Three staff were trained by a professional Santa Claus from Santa America, who is the official Santa Claus for the Kansas City Autism Society.

Best Toys for Babies and Toddlers

As parents, you are always thinking about how to choose toys that will spark your child's imagination and stand the test of time.

Children explore the world through play, figuring out how things work and how people think, feel, and act in different situations. Play also provides lots of practice in using language, telling stories, and solving problems. Here's how to choose toys that that will spark your little one's imagination and stand the test of time.

What about electronic toys? Don't be fooled by claims that fancy toys will make your baby smarter. There is no research that shows that adding lights and sound boosts a child's brain power. Remember: the more the toy is doing, the less your child is learning. **So, what toys should you consider?**

When & Where is Camp Gizmo? Camp will be held from July 11th to July 15th, 2020 on the campus of the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind in Romney, WV.

Who Should Come and What Do We Do? Families, professionals, college students, and others who want to learn more about assistive technology. A limited number of "focus" children will be accepted and assigned a team of professionals who help families identify and apply new strategies for solving their multiple assistive technology needs (preference will be given to children who have not previously attended camp.) attend workshops that meet professional/educational needs or assist the "focus" family. Teams meet daily to observe, discuss and implement strategies for the "focus" child.

Do Children Attend? Kids Camp will be held in conjunction with Camp Gizmo. All children attending Camp Gizmo with focus families or other participants will participate in Kids Camp educational and recreational activities. Kids Camp is a safe, fun camp experience for children with or without disabilities.
