Attached is a copy of the findings of fact and conclusions of law on your hearing held October 30, 2008. Your hearing request was based on the Department of Health and Human Resources' action to deny your application for benefits and services through the Medicaid, MR/DD Waiver Program.

In arriving at a decision, the State Hearing Officer is governed by the Public Welfare Laws of West Virginia and the rules and regulations established by the Department of Health and Human Resources. These same laws and regulations are used in all cases to assure that all persons are treated alike.

Eligibility for the MR/DD Home and Community-Based Waiver Program is based on current policy and regulations. Policy states that in order to be eligible for the Title XIX MR/DD Home & Community-Based Waiver Program, an individual must have a diagnosis of mental retardation and/or a related condition. The condition must be severe and chronic with concurrent substantial deficits that require the level of care and services provided in an Intermediate Care Facility for individuals with Mental Retardation and/or related conditions (ICF/MR Facility). (West Virginia Title XIX MR/DD Waiver Home & Community-Based Policy, Medicaid Chapter 513).

Information submitted at your hearing fails to demonstrate that you meet the criteria necessary to establish medical eligibility for participation in the MR/DD Waiver Program.

It is the decision of the State Hearing Officer to **uphold** the Department's action in denying your application for benefits and services through the Medicaid, Title XIX, MR/DD Waiver Program.

DECISION OF THE STATE HEARING OFFICER

I. INTRODUCTION

This is a report of the State Hearing Officer resulting from a fair hearing concluded on October 30, 2008 for _____. This hearing was held in accordance with the provisions found in the Common Chapters Manual, Chapter 700 of the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources. This fair hearing was convened on October 30, 2008 on a timely appeal filed June 1, 2008.

All persons giving testimony were placed under oath.

II. PROGRAM PURPOSE:

The program entitled MR/DD Home and Community-Based Waiver is set up cooperatively between the Federal and State Government and administered by the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources.

The *Medicaid Home and Community-Based MR/DD Waiver* (authorized under Title XIX, Section 1915(c) of the Social Security Act) provides an alternative to services available in <u>Intermediate Care Eacilities</u> for individuals with <u>Mental Retardation</u> or related conditions (ICF/MR). The primary purpose of an ICF/MR facility is to provide health and rehabilitative services. An ICF/MR facility provides services to persons who are in need of and who are receiving active treatment.

West Virginia's MR/DD Waiver Program provides for individuals who require an ICF/MR level of care, and who are otherwise eligible for participation in the program, to receive certain services in a home and/or community-based setting for the purpose of attaining independence, personal growth, and community inclusion.

III. PARTICIPANTS

Presiding at the hearing was Thomas E. Arnett, State Hearing Officer and a member of the State Board of Review.

IV. QUESTION(S) TO BE DECIDED

The question to be decided is whether the Department was correct in its action to deny the Claimant's application for benefits and services through the MR/DD Waiver Program.

VII. FINDINGS OF FACT:

1) In response to an application completed for benefits and services through the MR/DD Waiver Program, the Claimant was notified via a Notice of Denial/Termination dated May 5, 2008 (D-2) that Waiver services were denied. This notice states, in pertinent part:

Your Waiver Application is hereby denied.

Your application was Denied because:

Documentation submitted does not support the presence of substantial adaptive deficits in three or more of the six major life areas identified for Waiver eligibility. Specifically, the documentation failed to demonstrate substantial limitations in the following major life areas: Learning, Mobility, Self-Direction and Capacity for Independent Living.

(Substantial adaptive deficits were identified in Self-Care and Receptive and Expressive Language.)

- 2) Additional documentation was received and reviewed by the MR/DD Waiver office and a second denial notice (D-6) was issued on June 4, 2008. This notice provides the same explanation for denial, however, this notice indicates that only Self-Care remains identified as a substantial adaptive deficit.
- 3) The Claimant's representative contends that her son is demonstrating substantial adaptive deficits in *Receptive and Expressive Language* as well as *Self-Direction* and should therefore be medically eligible to participate in the MR/DD Waiver Program.
- 4) The Department stipulated that the Claimant presents an eligible diagnosis of Autism, however, the severity and functional deficits demonstrated by the Claimant (according to the documentation) do not meet eligibility requirements. Exhibit D-4 originally supported the presence of a substantial adaptive deficit in Receptive and Expressive language this finding was due to the results of a Vineland Adaptive Behavior Scale score of 58 in communication and the narrative information that appeared to support this finding.

The Department noted that a Speech Therapy Evaluation (D-5) was subsequently completed on May 21, 2008 and submitted for review in June 2008. This evaluation includes the results of a Preschool Language Scale-3 (PLS-3) that was administered to the Claimant. The PLS-3 has a mean (average) of 100, therefore a substantial adaptive deficit (three standard deviations below the mean) is identified by a score of 55 or below. The Claimant's PLS-3 Standard Score for Receptive Language was 65 and Expressive Language testing resulted in a Standard Score of 77. Upon review of the Claimant's testing scores, the determination was made that the Claimant is not demonstrating a substantial adaptive deficit in Receptive and Expressive Language, and a second notice of denial was issued.

Based on the evidence, the Claimant is not demonstrating a substantial adaptive deficit in Receptive and Expressive Language.

The Claimant's other area of contention is the functional deficit of Self-Direction. While there has been no objective testing submitted to prove or disprove a deficit in this area, testimony provided by the Claimant's mother indicates the Claimant knows his likes and dislikes, he often initiates activities, chooses toys to play with and prefers certain programs

on TV. Individuals with a substantial adaptive deficit in self-direction, according to the Department's expert witness, are unable to self-direct and therefore sit and do nothing or self-stimulate until directed into an activity. The Claimant's Self-Direction abilities are clearly beyond this level.

6) West Virginia Medicaid Regulations, Chapter 500, Volume 13 – Covered Services, Limitations, And Exclusions, For MR/DD Waiver Services, effective 11/1/07, includes the following pertinent medical eligibility criteria:

Medical Eligibility Criteria

The MR/DD State Waiver Office determines the medical eligibility for an applicant in the MR/DD Waiver Program. In order to be eligible to receive MR/DD Waiver Program Services, an applicant must meet the following medical eligibility criteria:

- Have a diagnosis of mental retardation and/or a related condition,
- Require the level of care and services provided in an ICF/MR (Intermediate Care Facility for the Mentally Retarded) as evidenced by required evaluations and corroborated by narrative descriptions of functioning and reported history. An ICF/MR provides services in an institutional setting for persons with mental retardation or related condition. An ICF/MR facility provides monitoring, supervision, training, and supports.

MR/DD State Waiver Office determines the level of care (medical eligibility) based on the Annual Medical Evaluation (DD-2A), the Psychological Evaluation (DD-3) and verification if not indicated in the DD-2A and DD-3, that documents that the mental retardation and/or related conditions with associated concurrent adaptive deficits were manifested prior to the age of 22, and are likely to continue indefinitely. Other documents, if applicable and available, that can be utilized include the Social History, IEP for school age children, Birth to Three assessments, and other related assessments.

The evaluations must demonstrate that an applicant has a diagnosis of mental retardation and/or a related developmental condition, which constitutes a severe and chronic disability. For this program individuals must meet the diagnostic criteria for medical eligibility not only by the relevant test scores, but also the narrative descriptions contained in the documentation. To be eligible, the member:

• Must have a diagnosis of mental retardation, with concurrent substantial deficits (substantial limitations associated with the presence of mental retardation), and/or

- Must have a related developmental condition which constitutes a severe and chronic disability with concurrent substantial deficits.

 Examples of related conditions which may, if severe and chronic in nature, make an individual eligible for the MR/DD Waiver Program include but are not limited to, the following:
- Any condition, other than mental illness, found to be closely related to mental retardation because this condition results in impairment of general intellectual functioning or adaptive behavior similar to that of mentally retarded persons, and requires services similar to those required for persons with mental retardation.
- Autism
- Traumatic brain injury
- Cerebral Palsy
- Spina Bifida
- Tuberous Sclerosis

Additionally, the member who has a diagnosis of mental retardation and/or related conditions and associated concurrent adaptive deficits must have the following:

- Manifested prior to the age of 22, and
- Likely to continue indefinitely.
- Must have the presence of a least three (3) substantial deficits out of five of the major life areas (term is defined in Title 42, Chapter IV, Part 435.1009 of the Code of Federal Regulations or CFR.

Refer to 503.1, Functionality section for a list of the major life areas.

Functionality

• Substantially limited functioning in three (3) or more of the following major life areas; ("substantially limited" is defined on standardized measures of adaptive behavior scores as three (3) standard deviations below the mean or less than one (1) percentile when derived from non MR normative populations or in the average range or equal to or below the seventy fifth (75) percentile when derived from MR normative populations. The presence of substantial deficits must be supported not only by the relevant test scores, but also the narrative descriptions

contained in the documentation submitted for review, i.e., psychological, the IEP, Occupational Therapy evaluation, etc.). Applicable categories regarding general functioning include:

- Self-care
- Receptive or expressive language (communication)
- Learning (functional academics)
- Mobility
- Self-direction
- Capacity for independent living (home living, social skills, employment, health and safety, community and leisure activities).

For applicable major life functioning areas, refer to Code of Federal Regulation (CFR): 42 CFR435.1009.

Active Treatment

- Requires and would benefit from continuous active treatment. Medical Eligibility Criteria: Level of Care
- To qualify for ICF/MR level of care, evaluations of the applicant must demonstrate:
 - o A need for intensive instruction, services, assistance, and supervision in order to learn new skills, maintain current level of skills, and increase independence in activities of daily living,
 - o A need for the same level of care and services that is provided in an ICF/MR institutional setting.

The applicant or legal representative will be informed of the right to choose between ICF/MR services and home and community-based services under the MR/DD Waiver Program and informed of his/her right to a fair hearing at the time of application (Informed Consent, DD-7).

Conditions Ineligible

- Substantial deficits associated with a diagnosis other than mental retardation or a related diagnosis do not meet eligibility criteria.
- Additionally, any individual needing only personal care services does not meet

the eligibility criteria.

• Individuals diagnosed with mental illness whose evaluations submitted for medical eligibility determination indicate no previous history of co-occuring mental retardation or developmental disability prior to age 22. The member's clinical evaluators must provide clinical verification through the appropriate eligibility documentation that their mental illness is not the primary cause of the substantial deficits and the mental retardation or developmental disability occurred prior to the age of twenty-two (22).

VIII. CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

- The regulations that govern the MR/DD Waiver Program require eligible individuals to have a diagnosis of Mental Retardation (and/or a related condition), which must be severe and chronic, in conjunction with substantial deficits in three (3) or more of the major life areas. "Substantially limited" is defined on standardized measures of adaptive behavior scores as three (3) standard deviations below the mean or less than one (1) percentile when derived from non MR normative populations or in the average range or equal to or below the seventy fifth (75) percentile when derived from MR normative populations. Additionally, policy states that the individual must require and benefit from continuous active treatment and need the same level of care and services that is provided in an ICF/MR institutional setting.
- While the documentation submitted for review identifies an eligible diagnosis for participation in the MR/DD Waiver Program, the evidence fails to demonstrate that the Claimant has substantial adaptive deficits in three (3) of the (6) six major life areas used to determine functionality.
- 3) Whereas the evidence does not support the need for the same level of care and services that is provided in an ICF/MR institutional setting, the Department was correct in denying the Claimant's application for participation in the Medicaid MR/DD Waiver Program.

IX. DECISION:

It is the decision of the State Hearing Officer to **uphold** the Department's decision to deny the Claimant's application for benefits and services through the MR/DD Waiver Program.
